


## **NEED TO KNOW**


hen Sharon Santoni left England to study

Before the Santonis moved in 14 years ago, the property had served as the weekend home of an eccentric French admiral and his family. 'When we viewed the house it was filled with zebra skins, deer antlers and hunting spears,' says Sharon. 'It was eclectic to say the least. Generally though, it was all in good order and the ramshackle barns had so much potential. Plus, the garden spilled out on to the open countryside.'

The couple needed to rewire throughout and replace an archaic waste system, but little else required immediate attention. So, after 18 months, Sharon had achieved her goal of creating a 'welcoming, comfortable and elegant' family home. 'What I love most about it is the fact that it feels very cosy but there's still enough space for everyone to have their own room.'




## SHARON'S FAVOURITE PIECES

3 'I made the rose-printed garden chair **cushions** (p96) using scraps of fabric left over from my grandmother's curtains. We use them all the time.'


